

Solomon's Knot Scarf



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Crochet the Solomon's Knot

Step 1: Elongate the loop

- Make a slip knot.
- Chain 1. Pull your hook straight up to gently stretch and elongate the loop until it is about 1/2 inch to 1 inch long.

Step 2: Yarn over and pull through

- Yarn over (wrap the working yarn over your hook).
- Pull the yarn through the elongated loop. This will look just like you've made a very long, loose chain stitch.

Step 3: Find the back strand

- Look closely at the long chain you just created. You will notice it is made of three strands of yarn: two strands in the front that form a "V" shape, and one single strand sitting behind them.
- Insert your hook into the space right between the two front strands and the single back strand.

Step 4: Lock the knot

- Yarn over and pull a loop through that space (you should now have two normal-sized loops on your hook).
- Yarn over one last time and pull through both loops on your hook.
- You have just completed a single crochet, which "locks" the elongated loop in place. This completes one Solomon's Knot!

Crochet a 3-Diamond Solomon's Knot Scarf

(Locking Knot: The dense little single crochet stitch that sits between the long, airy loops. This is where you will always insert your hook to anchor new stitches.)

Row 1 (Building the Base)

Crochet 8 SK (Solomon's Knot) in a continuous row.

When you look back down your chain, count the "locking knots" starting from your hook.

1. Find the 4th locking knot from your hook. Insert your hook into it and make a standard single crochet. (This folds the end of the chain over to form your very first diamond shape).

2. Crochet 2 SK.

3. Skip the next locking knot on your foundation chain, and single crochet into the knot directly after it. (That makes your second diamond).

4. Crochet 2 SK.

5. Skip the next locking knot on your foundation chain, and single crochet into the very first slip knot you made to start the project. (That makes your third diamond).

You should now have a row of three "arches" or half-diamonds.

Row 2 (Growing the Mesh)

1. Turn your work to start the next row.

2. Crochet 3 SK. (This acts as your turning chain. It creates the side of the new diamond and builds the height for the next row).

3. Find the locking knot at the very "peak" or top of the first diamond from the previous row. Single crochet into it to anchor the stitch.

4. Crochet 2 SK.

5. Find the peak of the next diamond and single crochet into it.

6. Crochet 2 SK.

7. Find the peak of the final diamond in the row and single crochet into it.

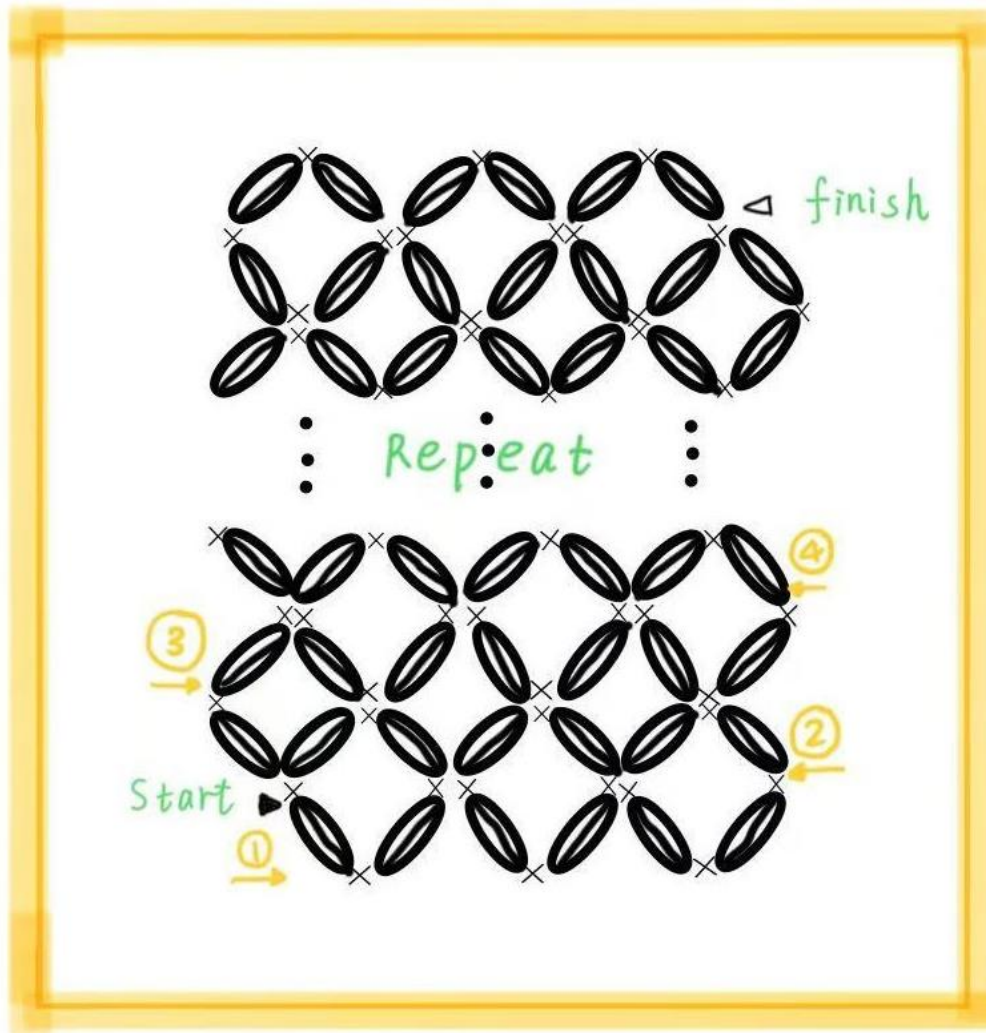
Continuing the Pattern

From here, it is smooth sailing! Simply repeat Row 2 over and over.

Every time you turn your work, you will always start with 3 SK to step up to the new row. After that, you will always crochet 2 SK and anchor them into the top of the next diamond across the row.

Finish

When the Diamond Scarf reaches 1.2 meters (or 50 rows, or your desired length), cut the yarn and weave in the tail using a crochet hook or tapestry needle.



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
